Spring rally to cover Petit Jean in aluminum

The Arkansas Razorback Unit's spring rally set for April 16-19, 2015 at Petit Jean State Park near Morrilton, Ark. is shaping up to be one of the best attended in several years. "We're bursting at the seams," said unit member Paul Moore, rally organizer. Thirteen rigs are currently signed up.

As the first official camping activity for the group in 2015, the spring rally promises beautiful views from Arkansas' first state park, and an assortment of optional activities for those seeking something extra.

Special guests, Hugh and Euna Ridenour of Pensacola, Fla. (and members of the New Orleans Unit) will be attending and cooking breakfast and Friday and Saturday night's suppers for the group ... there may be a Cajun flair ... Bon Appetit!

While there is not a set schedule, there are attractions nearby, according to Moore, such as an antique automobile museum founded in 1964 by former Gov. Winthrop Rockefeller, and the Movie House Winery in the newly renovated Petit Jean Movie Theatre built in the 1930s in Morrilton.

Petit Jean's grave is near the top of the mountain where legend has it, in the 1700s, French Nobleman Chavet was granted permission by the king of France to sail to America to explore a part of the Louisiana Territory. Young Adrienne Dumont, who was in love with Chavet, disguised herself as a cabin boy named Petit Jean (Little John) and was a stowaway on the ship.

After several months of summer in the territory which later became Arkansas, Adrienne fell deathly ill, confessed her deception to Chavet and asked his forgiveness. She requested that the sailors bury her remains on the mountain top upon her death.

Near Petit Jean's grave, walkways lead to rock outcroppings that make idea seats for early risers who wish to watch the sunrise over the river valley below. The view is spectacular.

Hiking trails and Cedar Falls are popular attractions for visitors to the park.

The rally fee is \$20 per person which includes the meals, according to Moore. Excursions are extra.

Bicycle rack lets you take your big toys along

I love running and did so for years. In 2012 my running days were cut short by the replacement of my left knee. Now I ride my bike for exercise and enjoyment.

When it comes time to pack for an adventure in our Airstream we always wrestle with how to transport our bikes. Many times they are just left at home because it's such a pain to put them inside, and I am always fearful of damaging cabinetry in this process.

When Airstream introduced the Fiamma bike rack, my wife, Terry, and I were both excited and yet cautious. After doing some research and talking to other Airstream owners who had purchased the Fiamma bike rack we decided it was the best and most affordable solution to our problem.

While doing some price shopping I found the best deal was with Colonial Airstream in Lakewood, NJ. I have done business



with this dealership before and have been very pleased with their customer service. As promised, the bike rack arrived in five days and I was excited to get busy installing it. As I opened the box it reminded me of

an Erector set from my childhood! Metal tubing of different shapes and sizes all packed tightly and efficiently, with just my imagination to guide me through the building process.

In some reviews I read negative feedback in reference to the assembly and installation instruction manual of the bike rack. I always like to read through instructions until I am comfortable with what is being described and can visualize the process in my mind's eye. That being said, at times I did struggle trying to understand the assembly process. There are very few written instructions within the manual, mostly photographs guiding you through the 16 pages of assembly and installation. I also refer-



enced the video produced by Airstream on assembly and installation of the bike rack. It helped fill in the gray areas.

I am impressed with the bike rack. It's built and designed for years of service. The high quality of the manufacturing process is evident, as all components fit with close tolerances. The assem-

bly of the bike rack took a little more than an hour.

I was now ready to install it on the back of our Airstream. While I was confident in my abilities to accomplish this next step, I was still a little apprehensive about drilling holes in the smooth silver skin. I soon discovered there was a needed modification for the rear bumper compartment cover; it was hitting the frame supports of the bike rack and would not lay flush.

There are three rivets attaching the metal cover to its hinge. Drilling the three rivets out, along with two more rivets to disconnect the up stop, the cover was off in just a few minutes. I needed to remove a half inch from both sides of the cover. I do not have the equipment at home to properly and precisely make these two cuts. I did locate a machine shop in Fort Smith that was happy to help me out.

After reinstalling the bumper cover, I measured and drilled the necessary holes for the support arms for both the left and right side of the bike rack. With that anxiety now behind me I quickly finished the straight forward installation of the bike rack finishing off the job by placing plastic covers on all the exposed self locking nuts.

Now with a safe and secure place for our bikes to travel with us, Terry and I will have the added dimension of enjoying Mother Nature from two wheels.




