

## Don't let pesky insects interrupt a hot shower

If you had to describe that sound a modern Airstream's hot water heater makes while heating the six or eight gallons of water, a blow touch would be appropriate. It's a sound we have all become familiar with and is a good indication the system is working as designed. While our Airstreams have many different systems integrated into them for our comfort, the hot water tank is the one that has always impressed me the most.

Our particular model of hot water tank holds six gallons of water and while some

models have dual heating options (gas or electric), ours is gas only. Over the years we have had good service from our water heater, continually supplying us with ample amount of hot water for all our needs.

While these hot water heaters are not technically classified as "on demand systems," they offer many of the benefits associated with on demand systems. We have never run short of hot water while showering or for other requirements.

With wife Terry's blessing, I hooked up "Lucy" and made my way up to Bull Shoals for seven days of fishing and just some time to relax. As I settled in this beautiful state park, I could feel a sense of relief; everything seemed to be working properly and I had time to do some fishing before sunset.

As an afterthought I flipped on the water heater so I could have hot shower when I returned from an early evening of fishing. As I was leaving, it dawned on me I could not hear the rushing noise normally made by the hot water tank when it is operating.

As I opened the exterior access door to the water heater controls, I could see a very lazy gentle flame that was mostly red and yellow. While I was relieved to see the system turned on properly and was burning, clearly there was a problem. Normally there is a blue



flame shooting out from the burner tube into the heat exchanger similar to a B1 Bomber's afterburner! The problem was there was no force behind the flame.

Not sure what was causing the issue, my first thought was the possibility of low propane pressure. I verified that the propane tanks were both opened all the way, then turned on the stove - it was working as advertised. Comfortable that the lack of propane was not the issue, I dug out the Atwood spec sheet for the hot water

heater.

Reviewing the operation and maintenance manual, I found on page five a paragraph titled: Preventative Maintenance. It begins with: "spiders, mud wasps and other insects can and will build nests in the burner tube," followed with the symptoms of such an obstruction. I felt this was the answer to my issue and began the process removing a nest if any.

I decided to go a step further than the procedure outlined in the manual (It's a guy-thing ladies. We like to take stuff apart to see how it works). I removed four sheet metal screws and removed the burner orifice and pilot assembly. For me, it was a much easier way to see into the tube and clean it by removing it.

To my delight, I found the problem. It was an insect nest of some sort and it was blocking the entire burner tube. One good shake of the tube and the nest fell to the ground. I reassembled the water heater components and proceeded with an operational check. The water heater has returned to normal operation.

This fix took me fewer than 20 minutes. The manufacturer's manual was an invaluable tool to help educate me and resolve the issue. As I returned to fishing, all my thoughts and concerns were replaced with a renewed focus on catching dinner!
