Razorback Unit will celebrate golden milestone

This month, members of the Arkansas Razorback Unit of the Wally Byam Caravan Club will return to the site of the first WBCCI International Rally at Bull Shoals White River State Park to celebrate



a milestone -- their 50th anniversary as a unit.

On June 27, 1966, the unit was officially chartered, and hundreds of members and rallies later, it is still answering the call of Airstream founder Wally Byam: To strive endlessly to stir the venturesome spirit that moves you to follow a rainbow to its end ... and thus make your travel dreams come true.

Larry and Terry Madden, unit president and first lady, have planned a fun and

informative rally set for Sept. 22-25. Special guest will be Steve Wilson, son of unit founders Gregg and Erma Wilson. He will share stories of his experiences as a young camper in a newly formed unit.

Other activities include tours of the North Fork National Fish Hatchery and Ranger Boat Factory, a lake tour on a pontoon boat, catered and pot luck dinners, and Madden's version of the summer Olympic games: junk in the trunk, sewer hose toss, and bean bag toss!

A rally schedule in this issue also includes a business election, group photograph and officer elections.

Bull Shoals State Park was chosen for the first rally in 1958 because it was centrally located in the United States. The area had gained widespread notoriety with the completion of Bull Shoals Dam in 1951, the fifth largest concrete structure in the United States, and known for the record rainbow and brown trout caught in the White River. The dam formed the 45,440-acre lake with 720 miles of shoreline in northern Arkansas and southern Missouri. The dam provides hydroelectric power and flood control.

Membership was growing to more than 500 trailers and Wally Byam decided everyone should be brought together once a year for an international rally.

The state park had been created in 1955 and was an undeveloped piece of property consisting only of a cleared field for camping at \$1 a night, a single light pole for hooking into electricity and an old lodge constructed early in the dam project that

was used for the park headquarters, according to an article in the March 2007 *Blue Beret*.

The *Baxter Bulletin* in nearby Mountain Home reported that nearly 400 (the final total was 380) trailers had parked on the campground overlooking Bull Shoals Dam. The highlight of the first night, a Thursday, was square dancing and a showing of slides made by members on previous caravans. The next night featured games, races, a goat barbecue, fireworks, and Wally Byam's birthday party with a cake large enough to serve 3,000 people.

At a Saturday afternoon bull session, Byam announced his plans for a one-year caravan through Africa. Later, a fish dinner was followed by a performance of the Baxter County Singing Convention and a fiddlers' contest.

The Sunday evening closing program featured Red Foley and his troupe of 20 performers from the Ozark Jubilee in nearby Springfield, Missouri.

Bull Shoals fly fishing lands memorable catch

Squeaky Wheel for the most intrepid readers implies something of a mechanical overtone. A reader could easily relate squeaky wheel to a failure in a bearing, tire or wheel. In this particular instance, it has absolutely nothing to do with the mechanical aspects of our Airstreams at all.

My first visit to Bull Shoals White River State Park was almost 16 years ago. As no surprise to my wife Terry, I fell in love with the park and it soon became "my place" to temporarily escape an otherwise crazy, busy life. As I shared my enthusiasm about Bull Shoals with co-workers and friends, their interest and enjoyment of the park soon grew into an annual pilgrimage referred to as "Trout Camp." For the next 12 years, my friends and I were all lucky enough to visit Bull Shoals at least once a year. Each and every visit was to be more



enjoyable than the last.

It seems like yesterday I was standing on the dock wondering to myself, "Ok, what next?" Getting an early morning start, my friends and I had launched

the boat and were on the river soon after sunrise. It looked like it was going to be a great day of fishing. On my very first cast I landed a nice fish and christened the livewell with it. My next cast also yielded a solid strike and yet another trout into the boat. This however is when things got sticky.

Just how fast a hook can fly (no pun intended) out of a trout's mouth is scientifically yet to be determined. But how fast the pain traveled from my now hooked finger to my brain is inconceivably fast. While closely scrutinizing the dirty hook now deeply imbedded in my middle finger, it became increasingly difficult for me to think clearly.


I have heard stories of how fisherman, when hooked, simply finish pushing the hook through the outer skin and cut off the now exposed barb, thus allowing them to easily remove the hook. Yes, I was so desperate I gave it a try. All I have to say about that method is there are much tougher people in this world than me.

Still standing on the dock pondering my next move, I told my friends waiting in the boat, "I am off to the emergency room at Baxter Regional Hospital. It's only a 20 minute drive, but who knows how long I will be in the waiting room?" Just then a welcomed cool breeze of air brushed across my face. It was stirred up by the wake of my friend's boat as they wished me good luck and waved goodbye.

Trying my best to conceal the embarrassment I felt from any onlookers, I was pleasantly surprised at how fast I was attended to in the emergency room. In less than ten minutes I was reliving my fishing experience with the doctor. He was young but very attentive and

caring. He shared with me that on average, the emergency room removes at least one hook every day. Now I am feeling like a member of an elite club!

The speed of the syringe needle piercing my tender finger skin six or seven times to numb the pain seemed to be much slower and more memorable than the hook as it entered my finger. When the doctor left the room for a few minutes waiting for the anesthetic to do its job, I took the opportunity to text Terry a picture of my finger, filling her in on the morning's events and seeking out a little compassion. What I got was good advice: "Get a tetanus shot!" Alas, the fine doctor removed the hook, and following Nurse Madden's advice, administered a tetanus shot.

The doc then asked me if I would like to add the hook to their collection, as he showed me a very large bulletin board behind glass filled with different fishing lures and hooks the emergency room staff had removed. "No thanks" was my quick but decisive reply. "This little jewel has more fish to catch!"

After September 25, 2017, all dues being renewed through the unit, (checks in the amount of \$70 and made out to the Arkansas Razorback Unit) should be sent to the following:


