'Riveting' describes 2017 events

Now is the time (if not already too late) to drag out the calendar and begin planning camping adventures for 2017. The Arkansas Razorback Unit's schedule of events is chock-full of opportunities that offer breathtaking beauty and adventure across "The Natural State."

And don't forget the bimonthly luncheons. The first luncheon of 2017 is Feb. 2 in Little Rock for pizza lovers. Others ahead include a new location for the unit - Heifer Ranch in Perryville in April, a Founder's Day luncheon in June in Little Rock, back to the state capital in August for barbecue lovers, Wiederkehr Weinkeller near Altus in October to kick off the second-annual Arkaluma, and finally, a December Christmas luncheon at an unnamed location. Santa hasn't decided.

"Because of distance and jobs, it's difficult for some to attend, but those who do manage to go enjoy visiting, catching up on news and exchanging travel stories," said Mark Magie, unit president. "Your Board of Directors has arranged for locations based on the first-Thursday-of-everyother-month tradition, but dates could be changed to accomodate members who prefer a Saturday if there is enough interest," Magie said. The president would appreciate any feedback on making luncheons more accessible to everyone.

Unit Treasurer Paul Moore has arranged a Sunken Lands Caravan in east Arkansas in April with stops at Lake Charles State Park near Powhatan, Lake Poinsette State Park near Harrisburg (and close to Johnny Cash's boyhood home), and ending at Village Creek State Park outside Wynne. The "come-and-go" caravan is designed for those who can participate in only a few days or the entire event.

The first opportunity for camping this year is for baseball lovers. A "Take Me Out to the Ballgame" rally is in April at the Road Hog Park in Fayetteville. The week-

end coincides with a tripleheader of games between the Arkansas Razorbacks and LSU at nearby Baum Stadium. "We are supporting our namesake!" Magie said.

The Spring Rally will be in April at the final destination of the Sunken Lands Caravan, Village Creek State Park near Wynne.

Head west to the other side of the state for the next unit camping opportunity, convenient to the northwest Arkansas members, at Devil's Den State Park in June. It is a buddy rally so members may invite other campers who are not Airstreamers.

After the scorching hot summer months, camping resumes in September at the Aux Arc Campground at Ozark Lake, the site of the Fall Election Rally.

Those who attended the first Arkaluma at Mulberry Mountain in northwest Arkansas in 2016 can attest to the fun and excitement of boondocking. Get ready for the second annual Arkaluma in October, dubbed "Burning Mouse" by last year's boondockers at a late, late-night campfire.

The year ends with a return to the Buffalo National River for a weekend rally at Buffalo Point. Campers enjoy the beauty of the cliffs and bluffs that define the national river.

"The schedule has a lot of variety and we're looking for other opportunities that offer out-of-the-box camping and fun times. If we can find an agreeable downtown, we will try an Urban Air campout, parking our rigs along a city's Main Street for a night or two. May is an open month, so stay tuned," Magie said.

A page included in this issue of Riveted Razorback has dates and contact information for all the scheduled events. Reservation periods will occur throughout the year, so look for emails, news items in the Riveted Razorback, and check the unit website and Facebook page for those announcements. It is advised to book as early as possible. "One thing we've learned in planning the 2017 calendar is that we should be working farther out on 2018," the president added. "We have tried to offer many fun adventures this year, so many in fact, that it would be a challenge to attend everything. Enjoy as much as you're able!" the president encouraged.

Shelley's soulful voice heard with Duke, Alabama

Editor's Note: Arkansas Razorback Unit member and director Michael Shelley was one of 50 business leaders featured in a recent issue of Arkansas Business. The article originally appeared Jan. 18, 2016. The "Exec Q&A" is shared here, with permission from the journal.

Michael A. Shelley is state president of U.S. Bank in Arkansas. He plays piano for relaxation, sings in the Immanuel Baptist Church Sanctuary Choir and with the River City Men's Chorus and has performed with the music group Alabama and with Duke Ellington.

Arkansas has seemed to be an outpost of your company, yet U.S. Bank is the 11th largest by deposits of 129 banks doing business in the state. What has been your strategy for gaining market share? With 42 branch locations and 43

ATMs in the state, Arkansas is an important market for U.S. Bank. We have gained market share in Arkansas through building skilled teams to provide first-rate customer service in consumer as well as commercial and commercial real estate banking What we do really well in Arkansas is provide credit to consumers and businesses. In 2015, we provided over \$315 million in new commercial, consumer and mortgage loans.

You'll be retiring at the end of January. What are you proudest of achieving at U.S. Bank? The team we have built. The bank gave me the entrepreneurial freedom to create and mold business units to meet the needs of our communities in Arkansas. You cannot find that sort of creative freedom at other large companies. The ability to identify, hire and mentor people and then to see them succeed and grow has been the best part of my leadership role.

Rust can be a hidden nuisance that's preventable

During the Arkaluma Rally at Mulberry Mountain, one of our members had some bad luck. Both of their Airstream batteries failed during this dry camping event. Had shore power been available, battery failure would have been more of a nuisance than the big inconvenience it turned out to be (driving to Sears in Fort Smith for replacement batteries). Dry camping necessitates the need for battery power to operate everything that runs on 12-volt DC.

Depending on your Airstream's configuration, the batteries can be somewhat difficult to access; you know the old saying, "out of sight, out of mind." I decided to give our batteries a good look and to hopefully avoid falling into darkness like our friends did.

During the inspection of the batteries I found the electrolyte was at the prescribed level, the state of charge (voltage output) was 12.70



volts, all good so far. Although the date stickers reflect the batteries are now four years old, I am feeling pretty good at this point. However, I took note of some pretty serious corrosion build up around the battery terminals which needed my immediate attention.

I decided to remove the batteries from their storage compartment to make the cleaning process a little easier. It was at this point I discovered the bottom of the battery compartment had some substantial rust damage.

Our Airstream (Lucy) is eight years old, and the last time I had the batteries out was four years ago when I replaced them. The batteries sit in a plastic cradle which insulates them from the steel compartment floor. I have no idea how long this rust has been eating the metal, but if I had done a better inspection four years ago, I am sure I would have avoided the damage and aggravation.

While the rust damage was substantial, I caught it before it became a necessity to replace the battery box. What it did require was a few hours of scraping rust with a putty knife in combination with a drill-mounted circular wire brush for cleaning the metal to a rust-free condition. Then a small investment of cash buying a rust inhibitor, paint and a spray can of Flex Seal.

I want to make something very clear to our members and anyone who might read this installment of Squeaky Wheel. Corrosion on battery terminals is due to hydrogen gas being released from the acid (electrolyte) in the battery. Hydrogen gas is very explosive, just like the bomb! It is imperative you are extremely careful when working around batteries because any errant spark can send you and the battery "to the moon Alice!" for those of you who watched the Honeymooners on television years ago.

Once I finished removing the rust from the metal, I applied a rust inhibitor, followed by a coat of Flex Seal to coat the battery box with a water and fume-proof seal. The final step was to apply two coats of Airstream's pewter gray frame paint, ensuring everything matched

perfectly. After cleaning the battery terminals, I then applied a corrosion protectant to them. Reinstalling the batteries was the last step.

"Why stop there?" I asked myself. I have the time and materials, so I decided to also rehab the "A" frame. It was showing some wear with chipped paint and surface rust. I removed the propane tank holder and everything else mounted on the frame, then sanded the frame starting with 220-grit and working up to 440-grit for an extra smooth finish ready for paint.

Once finished, I stood back to admire my work; it almost looks new! My investment in time, energy and money was worth it. In the future, I will inspect the battery compartment at least a couple of times a year. While satisfied with the repair, I know once rust shows up, it's a sure bet it will be back.

The recipe below for Sweet 'n Sour Beans is one Terry Madden cooked at Arkaluma this past fall, and it was a hit.

Sweet 'n Sour Beans

INGREDIENTS:

8 bacon strips, diced

- 2 medium onions, thinly sliced
- 1 cup packed brown sugar
- 1/2 cup cider vinegar
- 1 teaspoon salt 1 teaspoon ground mustard
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1 can (28 oz.) baked beans, undrained
- 1 can (16 oz.) kidney beans, rinsed and drained
- 1 can (15.5 oz.) pinto beans, rinsed and drained
- 1 can (15 oz.) lima beans, rinsed and drained 1 can (15.5 oz.) black-eyed peas, rinsed and drained

hours or until heated through. YIELD: 15-20 servings.

<u>DIRECTIONS:</u> In a large skillet, cook bacon until crisp. Remove to paper towels. Drain, reserving 2 tablespoons drippings. In the drippings, saute onions until tender. Add brown sugar, vinegar, salt, mustard and garlic powder. Bring to a boil. In a slow cooker, combine beans and peas. Add onion mixture and bacon; mix well. Cover and cook on high for 3 to 4
