A WBCCI International Rally is a logistical marvel that takes years of planning. And the not-so-small army of WBCCI officers, staff and volunteers who planned and executed this year's International Rally in Escanaba, Mich. should be awarded medals for their outstanding job.

The rally site was the Upper Peninsula State Fairgrounds, and Airstreams were parked where the midway is normally located, around buildings, under trees, along roads and on any available piece of grass. Airstreams with solar power were parked in one area, others using generators in a separate location, and vintage rigs in yet another part of the fairgrounds.

There were a lot of activities for the 1,200 or so campers, from quilting and photo contests, to choirs, concerts and dancing. There were bicycle excursions, a pet show, tours of the area including Lake Superior, vendors, caravan information, meetings and seminars, ice cream social and twilight movies, and a fasion show.

One novel idea to measure the financial impact of 1,200 Airstreamers in a commu-

nity was to give each attendee a \$2 bill to spend. Merchants in the area quickly knew out-of-towners had been buying gasoline, eating at restaurants, buying clothing and groceries, and helping the local economy.


Next year's rally is June 23-30, 2018 in Salem, Oregon.

Feel the heat? You don't want Sparky to visit

Don't you just love when a conversation starts with an adverb? So..., this is where my story begins.

A number of years ago, I installed and wired a 30 amp RV receptacle in the garage at home. This made it very convenient to plug

our Airstream to shore power and have ample power available to operate the air-conditioner and cool down the refrigerator while we were loading Lucy for our next journey. Everything was functioning quite nicely until late Monday night last week. As I shut off the 30 amp breaker to the RV receptacle and reached over to unplug the power cord, I was startled by how hot the handle of the plug was; much hotter than the typical slight warmth associated with the power cord. Most alarming, the wall around the receptacle was also pretty warm.

To say this sequence of events got my undivided attention would be an understatement! Every project from Terry's honey-do list that I had been working on, or thinking about, was immediately delegated to the back burner (no pun intended).

The next morning after getting my brain in gear with a couple cups of coffee, I began exploring the possibilities of what could have caused so much heat being generated around the plug and garage wall. I soon found two major contributing factors. As I slowly

removed the RV receptacle from its mounting in the garage wall, I discovered the hot and neutral wires had loosened more than a bit and showed signs of arcing. This is not a good thing.

When I had installed the receptacle, I took great care to tighten the three screws securing the 30 amp rated 10/3 wires to the receptacle. Knowing electrons moving through wire cause micro-vibration which can, and in my case did, loosen the set screws.

The other contributing factor was due to the location of the receptacle on the back wall in the garage. This configuration necessitated the use of an RV extension cord to reach the Airstream, which when added to the shore power cord, equated to a total of

50 feet of power cord. The two cords plugged together ultimately increased resistance in the wiring which contributed to them generating more heat than just a single power cord typically would. Combine that with loose arcing wires on the wall mounted receptacle

and we had all the makings for the potential house fire.

So, (there I go again) it's time for a fix; a good "let's not burn down the house" kind of fix. The solution was very simple really. Home Depot sells a weather proof RV 30 and 50 amp electrical box. After removing the old 30 amp service, I installed the RV 30 amp service box on the exterior of the house near the garage door. This location is 20 feet closer to where we park the Airstream during trip preparation, thus eliminating the

need of an exten-

sion cord. I mounted and wired the new box and reconnected it to the 30 amp circuit breaker. After checking the voltage with a volt meter to verify the correct voltage of 122 volts was available, I connected the shore power to Lucy and ran the air-conditioner for the entire day.

At different intervals during the day I felt the cord for any heat buildup and to my delight, found

none; everything was working splendidly. After I finished my beer and victory lap, I shut down all the power and unplugged Lucy when I made another worrisome discovery.

I was giving the Airstream end of the shore power plug a good inspection when I discovered that one area of the plug where the hot

wire makes connection to the inlet plug was melted. After disassembling the inlet receptacle from the Airstream I discovered more evidence of the hot wire arcing. The good news is that I found it before any major damage occurred and it was going to be a rather easy and permanent repair.

The SmartPlug is designed primarily for marine applications with very harsh weather conditions. It was not long however before the RV industry adopted this plug for its applications as well.

I purchased a complete kit from the Airstream Life Store (www.airstreamlife.com > store). It includes a new 30 ft. shore power cord and a new inlet receptacle for the Airstream. It was the best price I could find, along with no tax and free shipping. The SmartPlug is a truly amazing work of engineering and manufacturing, with obvious attention to detail. It was a 30

minute job to install, and it fits perfectly where the old inlet plug was installed. (see pictures). After I completed the installation of the new inlet power receptacle, I powered up Lucy (at this point I refer to her as the Lunar Module) and everything powered up nicely, with no heat or smoke.
