

Round and round we go, deciding on best tires

In our nearly ten years of Airstream ownership, I have heard and read more about tires than about any other single topic. I think there are more opinions about tires than Airstreams on the road today!

As any new owner of an Airstream will attest to, there is a tremendous amount of information to digest as you begin your Airstreaming experience. With all there was to learn about our new Airstream, I



paid little or no attention to the tires, with the exception of maintaining the proper tire pressure. Tires seem to be on the bottom of my list for educational purposes. I felt confident of my knowledge base when it came to

tires until I was surprised one Sunday morning on a return trip home from Branson, Mo.

As we stopped for a break I did my usual walk around, looking for any potential problems. It was at this point I noticed one of the tires was so worn I could see part of the steel belt protruding from it. I was very concerned that a tire with so few miles on it could deteriorate in such a manner. I soon discovered we were very lucky that the tire did not come apart and damage our trailer as many Airstream owners have experienced.

Thus started my quest to find a tire that would be safe and reliable. Scouring for hours, weeks and months on Air Forums and other informative websites, I did my best to come to an educated conclusion based on the experiences and expertise of the many thoughtful posts I had read. What I discovered was for every well-intended article, there were three more opposing points of view to it.

There was nothing left to do but figure it out on my own. Armed with some knowledge I had gained, I began talking to different tire dealers asking very straight forward and pointed questions. One whom I have done business with for many years told me he stopped stocking the Goodyear Marathon tires because of their failure rate. As our Airstream was originally equipped with the Goodyear Marathon tires, I started looking for an alternative replacement.

There has been much discussion about replacing "trailer tires" on our Airstreams with light duty truck tires, again both sides of an endless argument. Like most of you, I would love a definitive answer from an "expert," but I was unable to find anyone who would or could tell me what I wanted to hear.

A new trend in the Airstream community is to convert from the 15-inch rims that most of our trailers came equipped with, and retrofit to taller 16-inch rims and 16-inch tires ... the benefit being greater ground clearance. However, there is also the challenge of proper clearance in the wheel well area and the possibility some modifications may be necessary.

After all the debate and sleepless nights, I decided to purchase Michelin Defender LXT M/S 235/75R15 tires for our Airstream. This

tire is slightly wider than the stock tires, but gives more rubber on the road and fits perfectly on our current 15-inch rims.

Our trailer's max gross weight is 7,300 pounds. This number is very important to be certain the tires I bought have a weight rating sufficient enough to safely handle the weight of our Airstream. The Michelin Defender XL (extra load) is rated at 2,271 pounds per tire at 50-psi. This calculates to 9,084 total pounds for four tires. This puts the total load carrying capacity up 1,784 pounds over our gross weight and a number I feel very comfortable with. Another metric to consider is the tire speed rating. The Michelin Defender speed rating is 118-mph, not that I will ever even come close to that!

In comparison, the new upgraded Goodyear Marathon 225 /75R15 trailer tires are rated at 2,150 pounds per tire at 65-psi, which calculates to 8,600 pounds for all four tires. The difference between the gross weight of 7,300 pounds and the max tire weight of 8,600

pounds for all four tires is 1,300 pounds. These numbers reflect that the Michelin Defender XL total exceeds weight capacity over the Marathon by 484 pounds. As to the speed rating of the tires, there is another significant difference: the Marathon speed rating is The Michelin 65-mph. tire is also backed by a 70,000 tire mileage warranty and it's manufactured in America!

It's important to address one particular part of the tire buying experience. First, you must insist that your new tires are balanced.

Second, you should

educate yourself and anybody installing tires on your Airstream on the proper jack points. Most technicians will just default to jacking it up using the axles, which is incorrect. Your Airstream has clearly marked jack points located on the frame. There is also a square piece of sheet metal riveted to the exact jacking point (refer to your owner's manual).

Third, the cost (well it is a consideration for sure). I purchased the tires at Discount Tire. In addition to a \$50 instant rebate, I received a mail-in rebate for \$60 by applying for their credit card, and a generous military discount which was \$50. The total discount was \$160. My final cost for the four tires was \$457.23.

We bought the tires in late November and have been on a couple of outings, one being the Cajun Caravan. The tires are preforming extremely well, and with the lower air pressure of 50-psi instead of 65-psi, we have noticed a much smoother ride. Safe travels!

Apple Pecan Dressing

Submitted by club member C.J. Tinkle This treat is good anytime, not just the holidays!

Ingredients

- 1-lb loaf of bread diced, stale
- 1 pound sage pork sausage, cooked and drained
- 8 tablespoons butter (1 stick)
- 2 yellow onions, diced
- 8 celery stalks, diced
- 2 apples, peeled, cored and diced
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 1 cup apple juice
- 1 cup pecans, toasted and roughly chopped
- 1 tablespoons dried thyme
- 1- 1/2 tablespoon dried sage

Salt and pepper to taste

2 - 2 1/2 cups chicken or turkey stock

Method

- 1. Preheat oven to 375°F. Butter a deep casserole or baking dish.
- In a large fry pan over medium heat, melt 4 Tbs. of the butter. Add the onions and celery and sauté, stirring occasionally, until tender and golden, 10 to 12 minutes.
 Transfer to the bowl with the bread.
- 3. Melt the remaining 4 Tbs. butter in the pan and add the apples. Sprinkle with the sugar and cook, stirring occasionally, until the apples are tender and beginning to brown, 5 to 6 minutes. Add 3 Tbs. of the apple juice and simmer, stirring to scrape up the browned bits, until the liquid is reduced to a syrup, about 4 minutes. Transfer the apples to the bowl with the bread, and add the cooked sausage.
- 4. Pour the remaining apple juice into the pan, set over medium heat and simmer until reduced by one-third. Pour the apple juice over the bread mixture. Add the pecans, thyme, sage, the 2 1/2 tsp. salt, the 1 tsp. pepper and 2 cups of the stock to the bowl and stir gently to mix. Let stand, stirring occasionally, until the stock is absorbed, about 5 minutes. If the dressing seems dry, add more stock as needed. Adjust the seasonings with salt and pepper.

Transfer the dressing to the prepared baking dish and bake until browned and crispy, about 50 minutes.
